EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Oklahoma Parent Legislative Action Committee (OKPLAC) is a nonpartisan, statewide organization comprised of passionate, volunteer advocates committed to promoting policies which protect, support and strengthen the public education in the state of Oklahoma. As ninety percent of Oklahoma children attend public schools, OKPLAC believes the insight of their parents and guardians can and should inform state policy and budget decisions regarding public education.

The results section of our survey show the breakdown of each survey question. The ranked choice question indicates the percentage of people who ranked that item in their "top 10". Of particular note is the high percentage of respondents who ranked these items in their top 3: *qualified teachers, safe learning environment, and small class sizes.*80.49% of those surveyed ranked one of these items as their top priority.

Another noticeable distinction emerged as a majority of the top 10 ranked items involve enriched learning opportunities and areas which contribute to a well-rounded education. While assessments are an important accountability metric, survey respondents prioritize robust learning experiences with access to a variety of programs and classes, higher than test score rankings to determine a "top 10" education for their children.

SURVEY OBJECTIVE

In alignment with the OKPLAC mission, as well as in support of Governor Stitt's stated goal to make Oklahoma a Top 10 Education state, OKPLAC launched a parent survey to identify educational priorities of public school parents. Recent increases in education funding are a critical first step which must be sustained to be a Top 10 state. As Oklahoma continues to invest in education, OKPLAC believes it's important to seek out and consider the input and priorities of parents of children in public schools.

PARTICIPANTS

The survey was promoted to parents and guardians of Oklahoma public school children. 938 respondents representing 137 Oklahoma school districts (Appendix A) completed the survey. 20 respondents started but did not complete the survey. The sample population variable demographics include type of school, grade level of children, and geographic characteristics of the school.

The survey introduction included the following language:


If you are the parent, grandparent, or guardian of a child attending public school in Oklahoma, your feedback is very important to ensure Oklahoma takes the steps necessary to become a Top 10 Education state. Thank you for taking this brief survey to help ensure all Oklahoma public school students receive a quality education.

METHODOLOGY


The survey was conducted using Qualtrics survey management platform between October 1st and October 15th, 2019. The survey was hosted on the www.OKPLAC.org website and distributed via grassroots social media channels and email distribution lists. A \$100 Facebook post boost was purchased for the two-week survey period, and earned media was received via print and broadcast media.

RESULTS


School type:

Respondents were asked to rank the top 10 items they consider important indicators of quality education. Twenty items, including two open response options were provided and can be found in the complete survey listed in Appendix B. Ranked order response percentages were calculated with the following formula.

Conclusion:

The results of this survey indicate Oklahoma parents value a well-rounded, strong public education system for their children. Recent increases in investing in education must be sustained to continue to restore cut programs and positions, attract and retain high-quality teachers, and prepare Oklahoma students for a successful future beyond high school. It is clear that parents value opportunities and choices for their children within their public schools.

Many of the prioritized initiatives are most efficiently and effectively carried out at a local level where locally elected school boards and district leaders can work with their community to meet the needs of students. We hope state leaders and elected officials will adopt policies and make budget decisions which support the priorities of the parents and guardians of over 700,000 Oklahoma children attending public schools. A high quality public education system is the best investment in our children and in our state. Indeed, it is the key to ensuring Oklahoma is a "Top 10" state not only in education but also in economic, health, and various social indicators.
